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## Memorandum

**Subject:** COVID-19 Pandemic – Virtual Assessments

The Chief Medical Officer of Health for Ontario has issued a revised "Directive #2 for Health Care Providers (Regulated Health Professionals or Persons who operate a Group Practice of Regulated Health Professionals)".

The updated Directive stipulates:

Subject to the requirements of this Directive, Health Care Providers are in the best position to determine which services should continue to be provided remotely (online, by telephone or other virtual means) and which should be provided in-person. This should be guided by best clinical evidence. Health Care Providers must also adhere to the guidance principles provides by their applicable health regulatory college and [four] principles

In response to the evolving situation regarding the COVID-19 pandemic, and to align with the revised Directive #2 for Health Care Providers, the Assistive Devices Program (ADP) is making temporary changes regarding current requirements to perform certain assessments "in person".

Effective the date of this memorandum, the ADP will accept virtual assessments by ADP-registered authorizers.

As a health professional, an ADP-registered authorizer must make a clinical decision on whether a virtual assessment is feasible, safe and suitable in the specific circumstances of the applicant and complies with Directive #2.

All ADP-registered authorizers who are also members of a regulated health college and/or professional association should also be aware of any additional requirements imposed by their respective regulatory college and/or professional association. Members of regulatory colleges may be subject to additional requirements under the *Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991*, as well as any other applicable health profession-specific legislation and/or regulations. It is recommended that ADP-registered authorizers confirm with their regulatory colleges, if applicable, the appropriateness of performing virtual assessments.

ADP-registered authorizers must also ensure compliance with other requirements, including Chief Medical Officer of Health directives, government directives, and orders made pursuant to the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act*, when performing a virtual assessment.

The roles and responsibilities of the ADP-registered authorizers have not changed. The purpose of an ADP-registered authorizer assessment is still to determine the applicant's disability and possible equipment needs and apply to the ADP for a device for which the client meets the eligibility criteria. Assessments cannot be delegated to another professional or support staff.

The Ministry will notify ADP-registered authorizers when this temporary measure is no longer permitted.
